### From Chairman's Desk

I take immense pleasure in presenting  $5^{\text{th}}$ Annual The Report of CanKids...Kidscan for the vear 2016-17. This year has been a year of Amazing Growth and Heart Warming Stories for CanKids that motivated and inspired the CanKids Team to reach out to more and more children with cancer to achieve the desired objective of improving their survival rate.

Our program and services have grown by leaps and bounds as witnessed by 45% increase in the total expenditure from Rs. 8.54crores in the previous Financial Year to Rs. 12.35crores in the current Financial Year. With registration of 5047 new children under our Flagship Initiative YANA – You Are Not Alone the total number of families directly supported by the organization increased to 26184 since the beginning of our operations in the year 2004 as a unit of Indian Cancer Society, Delhi Branch.

















The seed that was sown in the year 2004 as a unit of Indian Cancer Society, Delhi Branch has grown over the years as a National Society, with total workforce 958, which include 182 paid staff and 71 regular volunteers and remaining as Path Pradarhak Parivarik Sahayak Group P(3)SG members and Kidscan Konnect – KCK members.

Our collaboration and partnership with donors like Deutsche Bank India, COROB, Indo Rama Foundation, First Capital Insurance, HDFC Life, Parekh Foundation, ABFS, EXL Services, Gokul and Lakshmi Laroia, Jiv Daya Foundation (JDF) and State Governments has further strengthened during the Financial Year.

This Annual Report provided an essence of the Programme undertaken by us in this year. Some of the highlight points include starting of India Social Support OPDs to provide holistic approach to the pediatric cancer patients from our Palliative Care Center at New Delhi.

















We have many challenges ahead in our efforts to achieve our enshrined goal of bringing a change in the Childhood Cancer in India by improving the survival rate of children faced with cancer at par with the international standards. We have the vision, the energetic team and know-how to achieve this critical step towards reducing the incidence of childhood cancer in India.

I hope this report will raise awareness and help mobilize the resources a crucial ingredient for success.

### Dear CanKids Member of Society

Thank you for your support to CanKids Kidscan- The National society for Change for Childhood Cancer in India. As we head into our 5<sup>th</sup> AGM as an independent National Society, the Board of Governors is pleased to share with you our achievement and progress in FY 2016-17.

2016-2017- An year of Amazing Growth for Cankids and Heart warming stories that motivated and inspired us to keep reaching out to children with cancer and their families, to keep rising to the challenge of helping more and more and doing more and more.

















We crossed the US \$2 million USD mark as funds raised in donations and grants in the FY 2016 was over Rs 13 crores

A Big thanks to our donors, supporters, CSR and Foundation partners and resource mobilization partnerships.

As well as to our Cankids Board, Management Team and Ambassadors as well as Resource Mobilization and Finance Teams headed by Arvind Kumar guided by Board Finance Committee chaired by Neena Manchanda Treasurer.















Our Programs and Services grew in reach and depth, as witnessed by a 44.4% increase in total expenses from 8.54 crores in FY 2015 to 12.35 crores in FY 2016. Operating (admin) Expenses Ratio went down from 12.98% in FY 2015 to 11.35% in FY 2016.

We registered 5047 children under YANA– you are not alone – holistic care making the total number of families directly supported to 26184 since our inception in 2004 as Cankids unit of Indian Cancer Society, Delhi branch.

Thank you to each one of our 8 Core Program Service Teams, 7 Care Centers, 45 Hospital Support Unit Teams and Regional Management Teams led by Priti Dhall, Rigional Director (RD) west, Mohit Agrawal RD East & Mr. Ravi Kumar-RD South.

















We expanded our footprint and services to 78 centers, at 44 centers where we have a CHSU project and at 20 centers worked with our partners Jivdaya Foundation in another 14 Centers providing outstation support and another 2 through Aroh whom we support in Coimbatore and Kochi in South India – making the total & 78 cancer centers reaching over 15000 new cases each year.

Change for Childhood Cancer projects State-wise grew, improved adding on Change for Childhood Cancer in Uttar Pradesh to the existing West Bengal and Tamil Nadu mapping out the childhood cancer incidence, prevalence and treating centers, providing access to care information and referral pathways, maps. strengthening service expanding and partnerships with treating Centers advocating to State Governments, and securing CSR and partners to ensure funding and donor sustainability. Rajasthan and Delhi NCR are other 2 States we have mapped out and still working to raise project funding. We will launch CCC in the state of Punjab in Sept 2017.

Thank you to CSR Partners and donors to these 3 projects – Tamil Nadu – HDFC Life, West Bengal – HT Parekh Foundation and UP – ABFS, EXL Services, DBS India, Gokul and Lakshmi Laroia and Round Table.

Thank you to each one of our 8 Core Program Service Teams, 7 Care Centers, 45 Hospital Support Unit Teams and 4 Regional Management Teams.







We provided Medical Support of Rs 17.38 crores of which Direct medical support was 4.1 crores and our wonderful Social Support teams facilitated Government funding of Rs 13.28 crores.

Thank you all - our Adopt a Child, Medical Assistance Fund, Disease specific Funds and CHSU Donors.

Thanks also to Team Medical Support headed by Dr Haresh Gupta and guided by Chair and Co Chair Board Medical Committee – Dr Amita Mahajan and Neena Manchanda. As well as National Outreach Projects headed by Gini Gulati.























Team Cankids grew to 958, of which 182 are paid staff & 71 regular volunteers. The number of Social Support Team members grew to 107, as we started providing more dietitians, psychologists, teachers and patient navigators to the treating centers through our Cankids Hospital Support Units and Care Centers. Number of Nurses funded by Cankids increased to 11 including 6 at our own Pediatric Palliative Care Center (PPCC). Number of doctors funded increased to 6 including 2 of our own at PPCC.

### HIGH POINTS – 7a

Cankids Parent Support Group was Pradarshak Parivarak Path christened Sahayak Group P(3)SG and its membership grew to 554 of which 45 have been trained and empowered as Navigators and Patient serve as employees or Volunteers on reimbursement. Kidscan Konnect. our Teenage and Young Adult Survivor Group increased its membership to 201 of which 14 have been mentored are CK and employees and interns in various Departments.

A big thanks to Board Member Srinath Mukherjee, a management consultant with over 30 years of assisting leadership teams transform their businesses. He has conducted 2 visioning and Strategy Workshops in 2016 in addition to driving professionalism and better work culture.

Under our Quality Care, Research and Impact Department (QCRI) led on a Honorary basis by Dr Ramandeep Arora, pediatric oncologist, we became Primary Sponsor of the country's first ever multi-center study on Hodgkins Lymphoma. Cankids is also the key facilitator and funder of Fight RB India – a national stakeholder group with 25 participating centers for Retinoblastoma (eye cancer) and Dr Santosh Honavar, an international ocular oncology expert's Vision 2020 Document - to save lives, save vision, save eyes in the next 5 years.

QCRI HOPE study - is a Multi-site Prospective Study to Determine Household Out-of-Pocket Expenditure Incurred by Families of Children Newly Diagnosed with Cancer in India across 16 Centers and aiming to recruit 540 patients in the study and are now ready to undertake an Access to Care multi-centre study of delays in diagnosis and treatment of childhood cancer in India.

vCAN – virtual Cankids Assistance Network has been developed and is being rolled out on a Salesforce Platform for NGOs to create a patient information system and database to provide assistance, track patients, follow up. Cankids has been actively working in the last 2 years to be able to use technology for patient beneficiary support and donor management. We have begun working on how to measure and assess impact, how to drive quality care, and to equip ourselves with requisite planning ability, resource and tools.

Our survivor- led CEPAA (Communications, Education, Public Awareness and Advocacy) is actively exploring, learning and using several digital and social media platforms including the Cankids website, FB, Twitter, YouTube channel

Thanks yet again to Board Member Srinath Mukherjee who has developed vCAN and the IT strategy of Cankids and to Volunteer Kanav Khurana and Intern Rahul Mukherjee, as well as to the QCRI, IT & CEPAA teams.

















Another exciting new development is the Cankids Pediatric Oncology Outreach Service (CPOOS) under our National Outreach Project, made possible thanks to the engagement of pediatric oncologists who are willing to give their time on an Honorary basis to provide Pediatric Oncology input, guidance, support and expertise to the treating Pediatrician/ Medical Oncologist. At Mahavir Cancer Sansthan Patna, the 1<sup>st</sup> such service started in 2015.

Monthly POOS by Board Member and Chair Medical Committee Dr Amita Mahajan, has resulted in patient registrations are up by 380%, treatment abandonment is down from more than 50% to less than 10%, and treatment related mortality is down from more than 30% to less than 10%! The 2nd service is by Dr Ramandeep Arora at Safdarjung Hospital in Delhi and by Dr Rakesh Mittal at BHU Varanasi Pediatric Surgery

Our work in building capacities and supporting a trained cadre for pediatric oncology has streamlined into 6 different verticals. Including Social Support Teams, Health Professionals, Parent Groups, Survivor Groups, Local and International NGO Partnerships and Team Cankids. In November 2016 we were proud to be invited by the Pediatric Hematology Oncology (PHO) Chapter of the Indian Academy of Pediatrics and organized PHOSSCON 2016- the 1<sup>st</sup> ever Social Support Conference for pediatric oncology in Indian parallel with PHOCON.

The 3 day Conference in Mumbai including a one day Workshop on Pediatric psycho oncology was attended by 150 people from 17 cities across 11 States with 30 participating social support organizations/philanthropists, 2 international faculty members and 44 national faculty members.

















We renamed our Team Outbound from Spandan to C(3) PO – Childhood Cancer Changemakers for Pediatric Oncology and the National Workshop in Delhi on 27-29 Jan was attended by 160 members form Team Cankids and Jivdaya Foundation.

As well, thanks to the Capacity Building Team headed by Sonal Sharma, Co Founder, Board Member and Director Capacity Building.







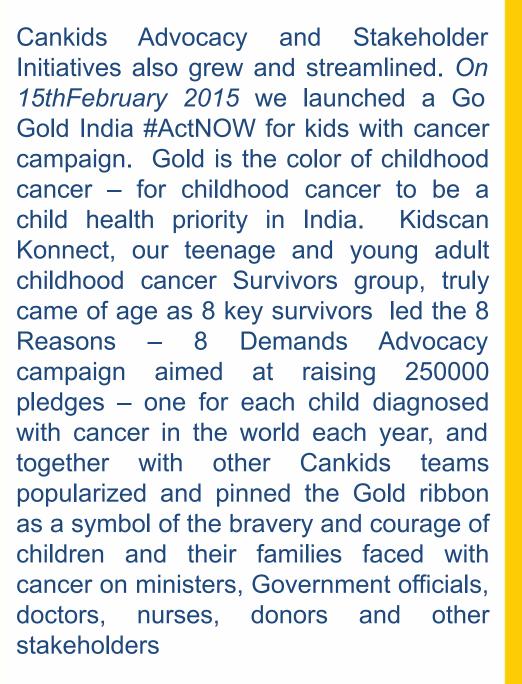

Children and families participated in "I Deserve" poster competitions and a Light it Up Gold Taj Mahal campaign - as they learnt to voice their right to best treatment, care and support. Chalo chalein Taj (Let's go to the Taj), a novel patient engagement and social mobilization initiative, finally brought over 1900 children with cancer, families, childhood cancer survivors and medical and social support teams from all over India to Agra on September 25<sup>th</sup>, when the Taj did Go Gold – with a 1<sup>st</sup> ever Childhood Cancer Awareness Exhibition over 3 days, within the Royal Complex of the beautiful monument of love, pledges, gold ribbons and a Go Gold Fiesta.

















The State Government of Uttar Pradesh also declared UP Goes Gold and has committed to a Task Force for Childhood Cancer Control Plan in the State. As has the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare in the Center. The WHO Country office has also committed support.

## HIGH POINTS – 13a

The Treatment Support Program, which developed a public health centered PPSN - Promote, Protect and Share for Nutrition Protocol for nutrition for children with cancer through provision of a dietitian, equipment, supplementation, ward feeding programs and appropriate counselling and parent and child education on nutrition, hygiene and infection control. Together with TMH the team has developed a Nutrition Management Manual, supported the 8<sup>th</sup> International Nutrition Workshop at PGIMER Chandigarh and leads and facilitates a Nutrition Stakeholder Group for Pediatric Oncology POSHAN. In FY 2016 itself we grew from 3 dietitians to 7 and now 9, extending services to 9 cancer centers and 4 Cankids Care Centers. For the 1st time we celebrated and institutionalized Nutrition Week in first week of September and Hand Washing Day on October 15<sup>th</sup>.















The Education Team which has got approval under our PPP with MCGM in Mumbai, to extend Canshala – special school for formal education in Mumbai, to BJ Wadia Hospital – a huge first; significantly expanded the Non formal education program to 27 treating centers, providing 21 more teachers/tutors, and opening up 2 more centers for the Cankids Education support Scholarship and merit scholarship program.















## HIGH POINTS – 13c

The Pediatric Psycho-Oncology Program (PPOP) which expanded its team to 17, including 12 psycho- oncologists, who serve 31 CHSUs and 5 Care Centers and provided 3584 1-1 special psychological interventions through 1842 clinics, 224 Group Therapy sessions with 1203 beneficiaries, launched Clown and Music Therapy to add to the Expressive Therapy program which already conducted storytelling, art and play therapy.

2255 children received Kekadu Make a Wish Box gifts, Toy Book Bank Libraries were run in 18 CHSUs and 4 Care Centers and Ward decoration programs were undertaken in 14 cancer centers notably JIPMER Pondicherry, JKLone Jaipur, SGMS Jammu under the Child Life Program. PPOP also builds capacities of all teams in Counselling, emotional support and patient navigation. 11 workshops were conducted with 325 Social support teams and Cankids stakeholders, including a 1 day pre-conference workshop on Pediatric psycho-oncology during the 1 st PHOSSCON in November 2016.















Our Pediatric Palliative Care Center (PPCC) celebrated 5 years this August 2017. It is the only stand-alone center in the country with both inpatient, outpatient and ambulatory care service. In its 5 year history, the PPCC has provided in –patient palliative care to 1141 children and their families – of which 517 were new admissions and 642, were re- admissions.

The PPCP has a complete team of qualified doctors, caring nurses, nursing aides, physical therapist, and psychologists. Having 2 full time doctors, 6 nurses, a psychologist, physiotherapist, patient navigators and social support staff, with close support and guidance provided by a UK based Palliative Care specialist makes a big difference in the care that we provide.

















On 18th March this year we have started a special 1st of its kind in India Social Support OPDs to provide a holistic approach to the pediatric cancer patients from the Center.- which runs 24x7 with 11 support services and 68 social support clinics each week. During its first three months it has catered to 714 children with 2256 times visits. As our presence in the medical community is strengthening and widening and our team is getting more empowered we are getting closer to our vision of having a flagship pediatric palliative care services.

Thanks to our PPCC team AS well as to Dr. Lindsay Crack, Peter Richardson, Julie & Dr. Veronique Dinand who provide honorary time and expertise to Cankids.

Cankids has small admin & IT department including supervisors at our Care centres & 6 people in head quarter. They ably managed facilities, House keeping, Logistics-Travel & Transportations, Inventory, Procurement, Security and assisted in numerous outing, Celebration, events, workshops, awareness activities, that Cankids has all year long.

## NOTE: 01 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Forming Part of the Balance Sheet As At 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2017)

## (a) Basis of Preparation

The Financial Statements are prepared under the historical cost convention on accrual basis and in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles and the applicable Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.

#### (b) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements is in conformity with the generally accepted accounting principles which require the Management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities on the date of financial statements. Actual results if they differ from those estimates are recognized in the current and future accounting periods.

## (c) Revenue Recognition

#### Donation/Grants

General Donation/Grants Income is recognized as income on receipt basis. Donation/Grants Income for the specific ongoing projects/purpose are recognized as income on accrual basis to the extent of expenditure incurred during the year.

Grant/Donations received for the purpose of acquisition of eligible fixed assets are accounted as capital grants. Such grants/donations are allocated to income over the period and in the proportion in which depreciation on those assets is charged.

#### Interest Income

Interest income is accounted for on time proportionate basis at the applicable rate of interest.

### (d) Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. The depreciation is provided as per the written down value method as per Income Tax Act, 1961. However, Fixed Assets acquired from FCRA fund is fully depreciated in the year of purchase.

Further Fixed Assets received in kind as donation from individuals are shown at nominal value at Rupees 1/- in the books of account and Fixed Assets received in kind as donation from other institutions/ societies/ trust, if any, are recognized at certified value given by



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## (e) Investments

All investments are stated at cost. Provision for diminution, if any, in the value of investments, other than temporary, is made in the books of accounts.

#### (f) Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions in foreign currency are accounted for at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction.

#### (g) Employee Benefits

#### Gratuity

Gratuity is calculated in the manner prescribed under Income Tax Act, 1961 and is recognized as expense on actual payment basis.

#### **Provident Fund**

The Society makes contribution to statutory provident fund account held with the Government in accordance with Employees' Provident Fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952. The plan is a defined contribution plan and contribution paid or payable is recognized as an expense in the period in which services are rendered by the employee.

#### Other short term benefits

Other short-term benefits are recognized as expenses on actual payment basis for the period during which services are rendered by the employee.

#### (h) Provisions and contingent liabilities

The Society creates a provision when there is a present obligation as a result of a past event that probably requires an outflow of resources and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. A disclosure for a contingent liability is made when there is a possible obligation or a present obligation that may but probably will not require an outflow of resources. Disclosure is also made in respect of a present obligation that probably requires an outflow of resources, where it is not possible to make a reliable estimate of the related outflow. Where there is a present obligation in respect of which the likelihood of outflow of resources is remote, no provision or disclosure is made.

### (i) Allocation of Common Expenses

 Central Core Services Allocation – of Core staff and administrative expenses of all the core service programs including Medical Support and Projects, TSP, PPOP, Education, CEPAA, Capacity Building, PSG and KCK. The allocation includes salaries and allowances of the staff. The allocation of Central Core Services to all the CHSU's as fixed percentage of the net direct cost of the CHSU as decided by the



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management. Where funding is already secured from other donor the same is not charged as allocation.

- 2. Central Admin cost allocation: taken at a fixed percentage of each CHSU or Care Centre budget as decided by the management. (Central admin cost includes Accounts and finance, Audit, monitoring, HR and Resource mobilization expenses).
- (j) The annual financials of the Cankids...Kidscan are the consolidation of all the charitable activities run by the Society across the country.
- (k) Note 01 to Note 18 form an integral part of the Financial Statement.
- (I) The figures have been rounded off to the nearest rupee.

## NOTE: 18 - NOTES ON ACCOUNTS

- (a) During the year, CanKids...KidScan received donations of Rs. 21,000/- (Previous Year: Rs. 1,55,200/-) as anonymous donation. However, the aggregate amount is within the permissible limit (i.e. less than 5% of the total donation received during the year), hence not treated as taxable donation.
- (b) During the year, the Society has incurred the expenses from INR account to facilitate the running of ongoing FCRA projects & program activities, and an amount of Rs. 22,11,527/- is outstanding as on March 31, 2017 (Previous Year: Rs. 42,43,232/-), which will be transferred to INR account in next financial year.
- (c) Under a Government of India notification no. S.O. 1431 dated 14-05-2010, NGOs were exempted from PF scheme till March, 2015. However, at the time of de merging from Indian Cancer Society Delhi, in June 2012, all eligible employees under PF continued to remain under the scheme. Under notification no. Coord./1/(1)(2010) dated 7 September 2015, the NGO exemption was withdrawn. In compliance of Employees Provident fund and Miscellaneous Provisions Act, 1952, the Board of Governors resolved to cover all the employees who are eligible under the scheme after March 2015. During the year, the Society has paid Rs. 12,74,001/- including employee contribution of Rs. 6,01,944/- to discharge the liability till March 2016. Further, interest / penalty on late payment of said amount is not advised by PF department, hence not provided in the books of accounts.
- (d) The Society follows project accounting in case of specific projects, resultant unutilized amount of specific project funds has been shown as a 'Project Fund' in the Balance Sheet. Similarly, in case if the Society spent excess amount against the amount received for specific projects, such amount has been shown as 'Recoverable from Donor' upto the amount spend/utilized on the same projects.
